Notes:

- This requirement can also be met with 6 credits of English literature and composition. **Regardless if this requirement is met through English or French coursework, 3 credits must be literature.** Grammar, linguistics, creative writing, technical or business writing or communication courses will not fulfill this requirement.
- A **French immersion** secondary option is available for applicants wishing to teach one or more of the following subject content areas in French: biology, chemistry, earth science, physics, history, geography, social science, and mathematics. (Note: French immersion teachers may also teach core French). In addition to meeting the French immersion Language Proficiency Requirement (see: <http://teach.educ.ubc.ca/delf-dalf/>), applicants must also meet the specific course requirements for their chosen teachable subject/s ([see applicable secondary worksheets](#)).
- A degree in translation does not normally satisfy the admission requirements unless the above requirements are met.
- Applicants whose first language is French and who completed a degree in a French-language university in a country or a province where French is the principal language should consult the Teacher Education Office about their French course requirements.
